### **WCPP Restructuring News**

Following on from the 2010 Fencing World Championships in Paris in November and UK Sport's World Class Performance Programme (WCPP) funding review in December, the Board of Directors of British Fencing have voted unanimously to bring substantial changes to our elite fencing programme in preparation for the London 2012 Olympic Games.

Effective immediately, the WCPP will be overseen by a Performance Management Group working in concert with UK Sport to bring state-of-the-art performance management tools and processes to ensure we field the strongest possible fencing team as the April start to the Olympic qualifying period approaches.

The WCPP will be joined by a full-time Performance Manager to oversee the day-to-day operations of the Olympic squad.

Graham Watts, who has served as Performance Director over a ten-year period – as a volunteer and as a paid, part-time contractor – will step down from his position with immediate effect.

British Fencing thanks Mr Watts for his efforts to advance elite fencing in Great Britain during his tenure.

Coaches and support staff will remain in place, as an immediate financial and performance review will determine future needs.

## World Championships

The 2010 season for all WCPP athletes culminated in the World Championships which were held in the Grand Palais in Paris in November. This spectacular setting saw thousands of spectators turn out on a daily basis and gave the athletes involved a feel for the kind of support that they can probably expect in London in 2012. There were mixed results for the 22 athletes in the British team. In the individual events Martina Emanuel (Women's Foil), Chrystall Nicoll and Joanna Hutchison (both Women's Sabre) reached the last 32 stage and both Nicoll and Hutchison lost their fights 14-15. There was more success across the board in the team events where the women's foil team, the men's foil team and the women's sabre team all finished above their world ranking. The men foilists (who were missing their number one fencer Richard Kruse through injury) secured a final position of 8th place, after a strong victory over the USA in the L16 stage saw them go on to have close losses to France and Korea. With the 2011 season just around the corner, all athletes are now in a programme of season preparation and training camps to ensure that they are in the best shape possible for the start of the Olympic qualifying period.

## British Fencing National Academy

The first National Academy regional session took place in Birmingham on the 21<sup>st</sup> Nov. The plans and timetable for the regional delivery of the National Academy programme are all available on the British Fencing [website](#), together with some video resources showing items developed following the National Academy residential training in August.

70 fencers took part in this session which had support from five Birmingham University staff and volunteers from the West Midlands region. The fencing coaches were Peter Cormack, Glen Golding and Peter Rome. Also in attendance was Anthony Turner, the lead S&C coach from the Summer who has been responsible for setting the testing & exercise programme for the National Academy fencers. Thanks to Lynne Melia & Sam Stockley for managing this.

The National Academy will start in the North East next, with British Fencing Academy, SUNEE (Sports Universities North East England) being led by Beth Davidson and Iain Aberdeen. ## Wheelchair Fencing World Championships, Paris 2010

The Wheelchair World Championships were held alongside the able-bodied World Championships in the magnificent venue of the Grand Palais in the centre of Paris. There were 138 competitors (restricted entry) and 25 nations in attendance

Our two best performances came in the sabre where both fencers finished above their world ranking going into the event

Tom Hall-Butcher (ranked 14<sup>th</sup>) fenced particularly well to beat former Paralympic medallist Staczuk in the poule. His overall placing of 12<sup>th</sup> is his best competition result to date given the class of the opposition. This should really give Tom confidence in his abilities and make him realise that he can not only qualify for London 2012 but push towards a semi-final place if he really puts the work in.

Vivien Mills (ranked 10<sup>th</sup>) fenced well in sabre too and almost beat Burdon (the overall runner-up) in her poule. In the quarter-final, Viv lost to Trigilia (ITA) 6-15. 7<sup>th</sup> place in her first World Championships is a very good result (she has been fencing less than 2 years). Unfortunately, Viv will now have to drop her favourite weapon and switch to foil as there will be no women's sabre event in the London 2012 Paralympics.

For the other fencers competition was tough! British final placings were as follows:

- Tom Hall Butcher - sabre 12<sup>th</sup>, foil 26<sup>th</sup>
- Simon Wilson - foil 22<sup>nd</sup>, epee 26<sup>th</sup>
- Viv Mills - sabre 7<sup>th</sup>, epee 22<sup>nd</sup>
- Suzannah Rockett - foil (no direct elimination stage), epee 22<sup>nd</sup>
- Justine Moore - foil 18<sup>th</sup>, epee 19<sup>th</sup>
- Women's Epee Team - 10th

## Filton College News

The AASE Apprentices' Programme at Filton College, the Bristol Academy of Fencing, received a boost last week, when the new sports hall was given planning approval in principle. The hall is a massive 70 x 40m and should be on-line and open by the end of the summer term 2011.

The exciting part of this is that fencing is planned to get its own dedicated space – an area that would make Filton College one of the world's best fencing training venues. We are now into detailed planning – working out the lighting levels, the number and spacing of the pistes and the

requirements for storage. There's no doubt we will end up with permanently installed aluminium pistes for accurate foil and epee training, and good grip for all weapons.

We are planning on an international standard of sprung floor over which we'll run the pistes and the top-class sports vinyl wearing surface. What a facility for the athletes training here!

The building is a modular construction and the time to build is estimated at 6 weeks – as long as it's not under feet of snow and ice, of course. Naturally, it will take twice as long to do the fitting out once the shell is up, but even so it should be well in time for the start of the new year and our new cohort of apprentices.

## Members Regional Affiliation

Following requests from several regions at last year's AGM, England Fencing have carried out a wide-ranging consultation and review into how the regions are structured and managed.

A number of changes will be introduced over the next year

or so. One change that will be noticed from later this year is that members will be asked to affiliate to a specific region, in addition to the current system of affiliating to a Home Country.

This affiliation will define the region for which they may fence in representative teams (i.e. Winton Cup and Cadet Winton), as well as the region in which they can enter regional competitions, such as BYC qualifiers or regional senior championships
